The Japan Meteorlogical Agency (JMA) announced in September 13, 2007, that an ozone hole as large as Antarctica appeared directly over Antarctica in mid-August 2007. This hole usually appears in August/September and grows to its largest size in September and October, as noticed in the past by NASA satellite data.

The hole decreases and disappears around November/December.

The amount of ozone depleting subnstances (ODS) has peaked in the 1990s and remained at high levels, thus causing the Antarctic hole. However, the good news is that the 2007 hole is not growing to the record size that 2006's ozone hole reached. The 2007 hole is right in line with average ozone hole size from the past 10 years.

While dramatic efforts to reduce ODS have been taken throughout the past decade and continue to be vigilantly pursued, the large amount of ODS still in the atmosphere will cause a yearly ozone hole for the next few decades.

6th - 7th - NAFED Regional Conference, Las Vegas, NV 17th -St. Patrick's Day 20th - First Day of Spring 23rd - Easter Sunday look at the actions that could have been taken to make the Montreal Protocol even friendlier to the ozone layer, we can't help but think of the missed opportunities.

For example, the 2006 Report of the Halon Technical Options Committee identifies "regional imbalances" (of halons) as a growing concern. These "regional imbalances" (too much halon where it is not needed and not enough halon where it is needed), if not dealt with pose an environmental risk. Experience has shown us that unless halons maintain a value (as in \$\$), kept in the stream of commerce and handled responsibly by recyclers and end users, the result is, at best, dangerous high-pressure cylinders rusting and, at worst, a continuing damage to the ozone layer through escaping gas. We ought to be thankful that HTOC did see fit to identify "regional imbalances" as a concern. Perhaps some MOP (Member of the Party to the Montreal Protocol) will notice this and do something about it.

Now THAT would do something about **the air up there**!

Spotlight on State Organizations: PAFED



The Pennsylvania Association of Fire Equipment Distributors was founded in 1988 by several fire equipment distributors who saw a need for a statewide organization that directly addresses not only national issues and concerns, but also state legislations, regulations, and issues as well.

PAFED faces many issues each year. One of the most recent concerns it has undertaken is the 2007 version of NFPA 10 (with its certification requirements) will soon be implemented into the PA Uniform Construction Code. With this change, individuals will not have a choice of being certified

manner to any emergency, big or small. Trouble areas are also discussed for specific systems, as knowing the potential problems before they arise gives each technician an edge. The seminars count for continuing education credits, and provide not only detailed information but an overview of the entire industry's products.

NAFED Recertification Policy

NAFED has recently updated their NAFED recertification policy for technicians to gain NAFED credits. Due to the specific nature of this update, we at The Halon herald have chosen to directly cut and paste the new policy, as opposed to reporting on it - we do not want to report anything inaccurately.

Please note that all of the below information is pasted directly from NAFED's webpage. Please visit and or contact them with any questions or comments.

Passing the National Association of Fire Equipment Distributors' (NAFED) Certification Exams is the initial step in obtaining certification from NAFED. Individuals who successfully complete the examination are issued a certificate in the appropriate discipline that is valid for 3 years from the date of issuance. To maintain the validity of the certification beyond the initial 3-year period, each certified individual must apply for recertification in accordance with this policy. To obtain a 3-year recertification, the applicant must provide proof of having obtained 100 Experience and Education Credits (EEC) (see Attachment A), submit the appropriate application, and pay the applicable fees. (Companies licensed by the State of New Jersey should see Attachment B, which addresses the particulars of that state's grandfather clause.)

I. Recertification through NAFED is required for all individuals who wish to maintain their NAFED

or not. In addition to providing a forum and legislative body to discuss current issues, PAFED also has a comprehensive certification 2 step process that is open to all PAFED members in good standing that addresses this issue. The certification is made up of 2 steps:

- Applicants must first successfully complete the Written Test by receiving a grade of 85%. The Written Test is given periodically throughout the state. If the applicant fails this test it may be taken again within one year at no additional cost.
- The Skills Test is given at the State Fire Academy in Lewistown, by Academy personnel. This test consists of ten skills stations dealing with fire extinguisher inspection and servicing.

Certification tests are offered in a variety of locations to meet the demands and implications of NFPA 10. In addition to certification, PAFED holds 2 meetings a year, one in spring and one in fall. The upcoming meetings for 2008 are April 17-19 (in Greensburg, PA) and October 16-18 (in Gettysburg, PA).

Current general membership has over 85 members as of press time, and associate members number over 25. For more information on types of membership and applications, please visit the <u>Application Section of PAFED's webpage</u>.

- certification for an additional 3-year period. II. The application for recertification, applicable fees, and documentation must be received by NAFED no later then 60 days prior to the expiration of the current certification. Fees are non-refundable, even if the application for recertification is denied.
- III. The application for recertification includes an affidavit that must be signed by the applicant stating he or she has provided accurate information regarding their individual EEC accumulations.
- IV. Information provided on the recertification application and EEC documentation will be reviewed for accuracy, clarity, and relevancy. If required, NAFED will request explanation of the information provided.
- V. NAFED retains the right to audit any application for recertification. A random selection process will initiate audits.
- VI. An applicant's current certification will remain valid during the auditing process. All information requested for an audit must be submitted to NAFED within 30 days of notification of the audit. Failure to respond within the 30-day period will be cause for the loss of certification.
- VII. Unless an extension is granted for collection of information or for an audit, all certifications expire on the date listed on the certificate.
- VIII. For an applicant to be recertified, he or she must present proof of completing 100 EEC's during the previous 3 years. (See Attachment A for a listing of EEC criteria.)
- IX. An expired certification can be recertified if the completed application is received within 180 days of expiration. However, an additional fee is required to process recertification application received after the expiration date.
- X. If an application for recertification is denied, the applicant has two options for obtaining certification.
- i) The applicant may challenge the decision and ask for a review by the NAFED Certification Committee.
- ii) The applicant may apply to take the appropriate NAFED Certification Exam and successfully complete the exam.
- XI. NAFED certification does not imply, represent, warrant, suggest, or signify compliance with any equipment manufacturer's or supplier's requirements, nor does NAFED certification grant any license or permit.
- XII. NAFED certification does not grant membership into NAFED, nor does it bestow any NAFED Attachment A EEC Criteria

The NAFED certification period is 3 years. In order to prevent a lapse in certification, the certification must be renewed prior to the expiration date listed on individual certifications. Recertification is obtained by:

- 1.Completing 100 Experience and Education Credits (EEC) for each certified discipline, within the 3- year certification period, or
- 2. Successfully completing a current NAFED

3. Additional time will be granted for individuals who are active in the performance of a military or jury duty obligation, or an extended medical recuperation.

EEC Earning Potentials

- 1. Up to 25 credits are allowed for each 12-month period in which an applicant is actively involved in the area of their certification. To be actively involved, a participant must be engaged in activities that are directly related to the area of certification for a minimum of 600 hours (15 weeks) within the 12-month period.
- 2. One credit is allowed for each hour that an applicant attended and participated in a systematic training program relating to the area of certification. This training may take place at the location of employment or at other venues. The training program must be one that is organized, includes a specific training agenda, and includes a synopsis of the training. Details of this training must be provided if the application for recertification is subject to an audit.
- 3. One credit per year will be granted for active membership in local and national associations that promote the professionalism of the fire equipment industry. Such associations include the National Association of Fire Equipment Distributors (NAFED), the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the Society of Fire Protection Engineers (SFPE), and state and local fire- and safety-related associations.
- 4. One credit is allowed for each hour that an applicant has actively been an instructor for a training program that relates to the area of certification. This training must be specifically related to the design, installation, inspection, service, maintenance, or testing of the equipment and/or systems applicable to the area of certification.
- 5. The application for recertification includes an affidavit that must be signed by the applicant stating he or she has provided accurate information regarding their individual EEC accumulations.

Attachment B New Jersey "Grandfather" Recertification

The State of New Jersey, Department of Community Affairs, Division of Fire Safety, has specific regulations that deal with the certification and subsequent recertification of individuals involved in the servicing of portable fire extinguishers and pre-engineered kitchen fire extinguishing systems. A grandfather clause granting licenses to some companies that met the defined requirements was written into the New Jersey regulations. However, per the New Jersey regulations, these individuals are required to be recertified by NAFED every 3 years.

These individuals need to apply for recertification and meet all of the requirements as contained in NAFED's Recertification Policy, including

Recipe of the Month!

Yum. Yum, yum yum yum, YUM. You can't look at this picture without having your mouth water a little bit! Perfect for the Superbowl or any night (pair it with a salad for dinner or some Spanish rice and beans!) and you; re set! Enjoy!

This recipe was copied from the Food Network's Website. Cheesiest Fried Chicken Empanadas with Chili Con Queso Dip

 $3\ \mathrm{cups}\ \mathrm{chopped},\ \mathrm{cooked}\ \mathrm{chicken},\ \mathrm{about}\ 4\ \mathrm{to}\ 5$ chicken breasts

- 1 (8-ounce) package shredded colby and Monterey Jack cheese blend
- 4 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 chopped red bell pepper
- 1 jalapeno, seeded and chopped
- 1 tablespoon ground cumin
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 (15-ounce) package refrigerated pie crusts Water

Preheat vegetable oil in a deep-fryer to 350 degrees F.

In a large bowl using a rubber spatula, combine the chicken, colby and Monterey cheese, cream cheese, red pepper, jalapeno, cumin, salt, and pepper. Remove 1 pie crust from pie tin onto a lightly floured surface and roll into a 15-inch circle. Cut out rounds, using a 3-inch cookie cutter. Reroll dough as needed. Repeat procedure with remaining pie crusts, making 12 to 15 circles total. Arrange 1 round on a clean, flat surface. Using a pastry brush (or your fingers), lightly brush the edges of crust with water. Place 1 heaping teaspoon of chicken mixture in the center of the round. Fold the dough over the filling, pressing the edges with a fork to seal. Repeat with the remaining rounds and chicken mixture. Place empanadas in deep-fryer for 3 to 5 minutes or until golden brown. They can also be pan fried in a frying pan with oil, just make sure to flip occasionally. Top with con queso dip. Note: Up to this point, the recipe can be made ahead and frozen for up to 1 month

Chili Con Queso Dip

1 pound package Cheddar (recommended: Velveeta)

1 (16-ounce) can diced tomatoes, drained

attachment A. However, the recertification issued to these individuals will state that their certification is valid only in New Jersey and is not an endorsement from NAFED that their certification is in compliance with the full NAFED certification program.

This distinction could mean that authorities having jurisdiction in other locations will not recognize the New Jersey-only certification. Individuals wishing to obtain full NAFED certification must successfully complete the appropriate NAFED Certification Exam and comply with the NAFED recertification program.

Individuals that are applying for recertification based on their New Jersey "Grandfather" status must include a photocopy of their New Jersey issued permit and identification with their application for recertification.
