Shipping Dos and Don'ts

can read the preamble to the Convention on International Civil Aviation<u>here</u> and ICAO's strategic objectives <u>here</u> A recent speech by it's president, Roberto Kobeh Gonzalez, touched on the following subjects: the rapid annual growth rate of air travel passengers (4.6%), antiterrorism measures, global air traffic management systems, avian influenza pandemic plans, reducing nitrogen oxide emissions, jet engine efficiency and noise reduction. A worthy agenda, we believe.

We travel often, as do many of our colleagues, friends and associates, and are predisposed to liking organizations who keep us safe up there at 35,000 feet. ICAO is an organization that is easy to like. It is staffed by talented and experienced members of the aviation community. Its last three presidents (a lawyer, a mathematician and a mathematician/engineer) spent entire careers in the field. President Gonzalez, ICAO's fourth president since its founding, holds engineering degrees in Communications and Electronics and too, has spent a career serving the aviation community. ICAO's list of publications, workshops and training is equally impressive.

That's why we were surprised to learned that at the recent 36th General Assembly meeting of ICAO in Montreal this august group – faced with an agenda that covered a mind numbing 62 different issues and hundreds of working papers over 11 days – (you can see the agenda here) took time to both detract from aviation safety and harm the environment at the same time. Even Homer nods.

Resolution 30/2 which recognizes the environmental community's concern "with the lack of substantive progress in aviation" in their conversion away from halons, urges steps be taken to mandate that airlines and aircraft manufacturers begin eliminating halons from their planes. While it takes a tippy-toe approach – easy replacement now, harder ones later, it nonetheless puts commercial aviation on the path to halon-free planes long before the world runs out of halon and probably before the industry is prepared to make the switch in a safe manner. (Remember, at its current rate of use commercial aviation has well over a 100 year supply of halon remaining in the world. (We addressed this in June. You can read it here).

We realize that most organizations involved in this subject have their own agendas. For the most part it is an "anti halon" agenda to which we don't subscribe – mostly on environmental and safety grounds! We would have thought, however, that ICAO would have asked a few more questions before they said "aye" to this environmentally unsound, technologically suspect but oh so politically correct proposal.

This article was run in a 2005 issue. While it is 2 years old, we thought it was valuable to publish again!

Packing old, (sometimes rusted, sometimes high pressure and almost ALWAYS different sizes) halon cylinders for shipment is probably not something that you or your shop employees do on a regular basis. Doing this incorrectly, however, can result in danger to you, your employees or the motor carrier, so we thought it was time for a refresher course.

First, some "NEVERS!!!":

- NEVER ship a charged halon (or FM200) cylinder with ANY actuating devices in place!!
- NEVER ship a charged halon cylinder if it is missing a shipping plug or cap!!
- NEVER "skid" a cylinder with its valve hanging over the edge.

Now for some "Do's":

- Pack your cylinders on pallets or skids with metal or plastic straps. This ensures that the cylinder will not fall over easily in the truck. A pallet/skid stabilizes each cylinder or set of cylinders. Most carriers require all cylinders to be packed on skids to be shipped.
- All discharge ports should be capped or plugged and any activation pins covered. If cylinder has an explosive or gas cartridge actuator (squib) this MUST be removed prior to shipment.
- Create shipping labels with a "To" and a "From" for each cylinder, just in case the shipment gets separated. Affix each of the shipping address labels to each cylinder/skid.
- Affix one 4"x 4" green "Non-Flammable Gas" label above each shipping label (these labels have the UN number on them).
- Make sure you have an MSDS detailing the information on the shipment. An MSDS is a Materials Safety and Data Sheet, which outlines the hazardous substance and its effects. The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) requires a "hazmat emergency number" answered 24/7 in case the product discharges.
- Create a Bill of Lading for each shipment. The Bill of Lading is required for every shipment. It lists the shipper, consignee, who the shipment is getting billed to, and the specifications on the shipment. Make 2 copies of the Bill of Lading. At time of pickup, driver will sign one copy of Bill of Lading which you will keep. Driver will take second copy of Bill of Lading and a copy of the Material Safety Data Sheet.

Airbus Fuel Alternative Group

At the Dubai Airshow no November 13, Qatar Petroleum, Qatar Fuel Company, Airbus, Rolls Royce plc, Shell International Petroleum Company Ltd., and the Qatar Science and Technology Park signed an agreement to research and study the potential benefits of synthetic jet fuel in their aviation engines. Gas to liquid (GTL) synthetic jet fuels have benefits that could be an economical reduction in CO2 emissions, enhanced payload range, reduced fuel burn, and increased engine durability.

GTLs are being developed for international standards for aviation use under the auspices of the industry wide Commerical Alternative Aivation Fuels Initiative - Airbus, Shell, and Rolls Royce are all members. The synthetic fuels are to be mixed with kerosene to enhance engine performance. While these will not be fully synthetic, they will enable proper research of the possibility of 100% synthetic fules.

"Airbus is committed to becoming an eco-efficient enterprise, growing and adding value with less and less impact on the environment," says Christian Scherer, Executive Vice President, Strategy and Future Programmes, Airbus. "No one industry has all the answers, and as companies pool together in a united front to research options for alternative fuels, we are delighted to co-operate with Qatar, Rolls-Royce and Shell. We are engaging in a project aimed at understanding the potential of GTL Kerosene Fuel to power aircraft. For Airbus, co-operation remains key to finding technology driven solutions that address global and local environmental challenges facing us."

Boeing Introduces New Training

Boeing has successfully conducted its very first Live, Virtual, and Constructive (LVC) training program. This landmark program opens the door for future virtual training, in areas such as the military, even. The technology that enabled this significantly decreases the live needs for a training program, thus creating a much more cost effective training environment while still maintaining full comprehensive training.

An F-15E aircraft was networked live along with an F-15E virtual simulator. Computer generated threats were integrated into the live and the virutal F-15Es. During the demonstration, technicians connected the live F-15E to a facsimile of the Distributed Mission Operations Network, which allows pilots to train together around the globe. The live aircraft and the manned F-15E simulator, operating as a wingman, targeted and destroyed the simulated threats that appeared on their respective radar displays.

"Today's event marked a huge leap in demonstrating Boeing's state-of-the-art technology that supports the U.S. Department of Defense vision of LVC training capabilities," said Tony Jones, Boeing vice president, Training Systems & Services. "To be able to link a real aircraft with a simulator and train is amazing. Most people just talk about this capability, but Boeing is delivering it."
